Small Groups

You hear a lot about **small groups** these days; churches of virtually **every** denomination **practice** them and **sing** their praises; but some consider them a waste of time that distracts people from church business

No matter what you **think** of them, you **ought** to know that God **invented** small groups and **wrote** the book on them

The early church

- Let the apostles <u>set the</u>
 <u>standard</u> for what they believed
 - Lived like <u>one</u> family
- Celebrated the <u>Lord's</u> Supper
 - Spent <u>quiet time</u> with God

The early church

Was filled with <u>awe</u> because of the <u>impressive</u> way God displayed His jaw-dropping power through its inspired leadership

44All the believers kept meeting together, and they shared everything with each other.

The early church

Regularly shared each other's company and considered whatever they owned community property



⁴⁵From time to time, they **sold** their **property** and other **possessions** and **distributed** the money to **anyone** who needed it.

The early church

Gave away **every** penny from the **sale** of their *personal* stuff to **those** who **needed** it



46The believers went to the temple every day with one passion. They ate at each other's homes and gladly shared their food in heartfelt harmony.

The early church

Visited God's house daily with the same motive, and gladly invited one another to share a home-cooked meal with their families



⁴⁷At the same time, they **praised God** and had **the good will** of **all** the people. **Every day** the Lord **saved** people and **added** them to the **group**

The early church

Expressed admiration for God, got rave reviews from everyone in town, and grew daily as God rescued people from eternal destruction

What was the secret of its success?
The purity of its doctrines?

The Real Secret

Was the unity of the early church represented by all-inclusive words, like:

The disciples were devoted
Wonder came over everyone
All the believers kept meeting together
They sold...and distributed to anyone
The believers went...with one passion
They ate at each others homes
They praised...and had the good will of all
The Lord...added to the group

And where did they get this unity?

How did they maintain it?

Through intimately interactive small groups!

How else could **3,120** members:
Have room for **fellowship**, **gather** for the Lord's Supper, keep meeting **together**, **fit** around tables in **homes**, and **absorb** new members daily—when they weren't meeting at a **big** place like the **Temple?**




Meet in Homes

- Separate from other groups
- In a cozy, friendly atmosphere
- To develop close relationships
- To become a **team** for Christ
- To get along on their own
 - Without a **storefront** presence in the community




Share certain characteristics

- 1. Subscribe to apostolic teaching
 - Share the apostles' fellowship with the Father and the Son, by faith
 - Take the LORD's Supper in their homes
 - Pray without ceasing



2. Gather around Christ





- People come together because of their relationship w/Christ
- This relationship **binds** them to one another
- The nearer they get to Christ, the closer they get to each other
- Ultimately, the Christ-bond makes these groups virtually
 - —indestructible



- Jesus told His disciples: When 2
 or 3 gather in My name, there I
 am [present] in the midst of
 them—Matt 18:20
- David said to the Lord: In your presence there is fulness of joy—Ps 16:11
- Small groups enjoy themselves when they practice God's presence

Biblical Small Groups



3. Study the Bible with Jesus as the Teacher

- First, disciples study alone with the Master
- Then, they come together in the Master's presence to share their discoveries
- Finally, they confirm what others share with them—
 with Him



- To organize an HBF
 - **Invite** people to a home
 - Make them feel welcome
 - **Share** *Ring around the Rabbi*
 - Show them QuikestSkills,
 QuikestSteps, and QuikestTools
 - Pass out QuikestStudy materials
 - Choose a passage to study
 - Covenant to study alone daily and to meet weekly as a group
 - Set location, time, and day
 - Offer a consecration prayer



- Get ready for meetings
 - Do your **homework** to *practice* skills and *prepare* for discussion
 - Go the **extra** mile to *know* your material **better** and to **bring** in special helps for others
 - Prepare a practical lesson plan to maximize meeting time (see, "Growth-Group Guidelines" for all sorts of helpful forms)
 - Bring things others may forget



Getting Started

- Start the meeting on time
- Help everyone to get acquainted
- Focus everyone on Christ
 - With a **peppy** introduction to the evening's text
 - Develop a discussion question that will trigger honest reactions
 - Pray for Christ's leadership
 - Complete the transition to the text with a question that draws brief, broad answers about the lesson in general



Get on with it

- Connect everyone with the Master
 - Ask a variety of questions that will plunge the group into the world of the Bible book
 - Show them **how** to get **answers** from the *text*, *notes*, and *book*
 - **Challenge** the group to bring in what they' ve learned so far
 - **Summarize** from time to time to prevent information overload



Class is in session

- Lead by example
- Encourage freedom of expression
- Promote learning
 - Don't treat everyone the same
 - Give each one time to learn
 - Focus on understanding rather than finishing the exercise
 - Equip rather than indoctrinate
 - Mentor rather than dominate
 - Be a **facilitator**—leader



GUIDELINES FOR DISCUSSION

- 1. Make sure everyone understands that the group will discuss what they have studied. No one will lecture the group, or dominate the discussion.
- 2. Explain that God always has the last word; neither the leader nor the majority rule. The group will turn to the Scriptures for the final outcome of every discussion. The group will honor the sanctity of personal conviction.



3. No one should jump ahead of the group and introduce advanced information from later steps into group discussions.

It is unfair to the rest of the group to discuss something as a group that the group as a whole has not studied for itself.



4. The group must agree to Berean rules for every discussion.

Like the legendary Bible students from Acts 17, the group must listen when others speak and save their questions. Not only is it rude to draw conclusions or interrupt others before they finish speaking, but it also wastes the group's time to grill people based on incomplete info.



4. The group must agree to Berean rules for every discussion (cont' d)

Explain that, if they'll wait until the speaker is through, their questions will probably get answered, or they will have enough info to properly consider what was said.



5. Discussions will focus on the text at hand, and the group must confine itself to the text rather than bring in outside authorities. No one should invite a speaker to come and "set the group straight," quote resources that back up their positions, or repeat what others have said about the text...



5. Discussions will focus on the text at hand (cont' d.) unless they can trace their thoughts to someone or something actually in the text. God's Word and its personal investigation by the group take precedence over anything else.




- 6. Encourage the group to pray for each other and to affirm one another. This way everyone will experience loving respect from the others in the group.
- 7. Urge members to prepare for meetings. True discipleship requires one-on-one time with the Master. True, they will experience Christ as a group during meetings, but nothing replaces a personal tour of the Word with Jesus. Everyone should personally investigate the text, so they will have something to contribute to the meeting.

They put him or her in the place of Christ




He or she controls the group and any outcomes

A TYPICAL MEETING


After years of presenting seminars and conducting workshops, we've learned that you can count on three things to happen at each event:

- (1) Some people will get **bogged down** from the **baggage** they bring to the meetings;
- (2) Most people will get **fired up** and spend more **quality** time with Christ in His Word; and
- (3) Leader-types will want some kind of **format** to follow at their meetings. Used to disciple-led **lectures**, they want us to **spell out** a hard and fast way to *configure* every group **discussion**. We show them, instead, how **Jesus** led **His** small group, in a **variety** of situations

Key Elements

Rabbi Jesus was the greatest small group leader of all time. He always conducted successful meetings: and those who attended always benefited from His leadership.

Since we want Him in charge of our group get-togethers, we should pattern our fellowships after His model meetings. A study of Christ-led gatherings shows the Master's approach to the study of Scripture in the small-group setting.



Sermon on the Mount

On this occasion, Christ met with His small group, the twelve disciples, **plus** a large number of visitors. Let's look at His blueprint for successful spiritual interaction with outsiders to the group:

1. Christ set Himself up as the only Teacher

Rabbis **stood up** to read Scripture (Luke 4:16); but they **sat down** to teach (Luke 4:20) in Moses' seat —a **chair** carved out of rock (Matthew 23:2). Jesus sat down atop a rocky **mountain**—a Moses seat with dimensions that matched His status as the greatest Rabbi—and began to teach (Matthew 5:1).

2. He taught the lesson

Jesus taught the lesson to His disciples, so that the rest could hear His Word (Matthew 5:2-7:20).


3. He issued a challenge

Jesus summed up His lesson by challenging everyone to live by what they heard Him say (Matthew 7:21-27).

4. The outsiders reflected on His Words.

When Jesus finished teaching, the visitors easily saw the difference between Him and the rest of Israel's run of the mill teachers:

After Jesus finished saying these things, the crowds were amazed at His teaching, for He was teaching them as someone with true delegated authority—unlike the official teachers of religious law (Matthew 7:28, 29)



Parable of the Sower

This time, Christ spoke to His small group—the twelve disciples—as **part of** a larger group, including a substantial number of visitors.

1. Christ set Himself up as the only Teacher

Again, Jesus sat down to teach—only this time, aboard a ship on the sea (Matthew 13:1).

2. He taught the lesson.


Jesus taught the lesson to everyone along the shore (Matthew 13:2). While the disciples separated themselves from the rest of the people on the mount, Jesus separated His disciples from the rest by speaking in parables (Matthew 13:3-8).

3. He issued a challenge.

Jesus climaxed His lesson by challenging everyone to hear what He said (Matthew 13:9).

- 4. The disciples discussed His Words with Him When Jesus finished teaching, His disciples wanted to know why He spoke in parables (Matthew 13:10). Jesus explained that parables separate the disciple from the casual classmate (Matthew 13:11-17).
- 5. Jesus led them into deeper investigation.

 Then, Jesus explained the terms and the parable, but each disciple still needed to *hear* Him in order to understand it (Matthew 13:18-23).



The Last Supper

This time, Christ spoke to His small group—the twelve disciples—alone, without visitors.

1. Christ set Himself up as the only Teacher.

Once more, Jesus sat down to teach (Matthew 26:20), after His disciples prepared refreshments and secured the location according to the Master's instructions (Matthew 26:17-19).

2. He warmed up the group.

Jesus separated the group from the world by seating them and focusing them on the matters at hand (Matthew 26:20-25).

3. He taught a deep lesson with a challenge

Jesus taught a lesson that only His disciples would appreciate. He issued instructions, challenging them to live by what He said to them (Matthew 26:26-29).

4. The meeting ended with a song

The meeting ended with the singing of religious music (Matthew 26:30).



WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED?

- Jesus was always the Teacher
- The disciples gave Him their full attention, and discussed what He said with Him
- He expected disciples to make an effort to understand what He said and to dig deeper, later
- He picked the time and place, made them feel welcome, separated them from the world, and focused them on the subject for the meeting
- He supplemented lessons with refreshments and music



A CHRIST-CENTERED MEETING

- The Master's approach to small groups suggests the following format:
- WARM-UP TIME [10-15 minutes]
 - Refreshments
 - Icebreaker
 - Introduce the study
 - Discussion question
 - Prayer for Christ's leadership
 - Consideration question



- CONNECT WITH THE MASTER [10-15 minutes]
 - Questions
- GROW FROM YOUR TIME WITH THE MASTER [30-45 minutes]
 - Share Discoveries [answers to the questions]
 - Respond Daily to experiences
 through the text [journal entries]



- WRAP UP [5 minutes]
 - Summarize the Lesson
- FOLLOW UP [5-10 minutes]
 - Plan the next week's meeting with the group (date, time, location, purpose, format, and individual tasks)
 - Closing Prayer (express concern for everyone—from group needs to personal study time)

Conclusion



- From our brief look at the early church and the way Jesus led His small group we have learned, that small groups:
 - Organize disciples so Christ can lead them the way He always intended
 - Provide opportunities for people to support one another in this life, as Christ prepares them for the next
 - Maximize the church's efforts now, as they prepare to be the house churches of tomorrow

The Last Word

Dissatisfied with simply settling members into pews, John Wesley said:
"How grievously are they mistaken who imagine that as soon as the children are born they need take no more care of them."

Convinced that converts need intimate, ongoing care, he also warned that people awakened by the Holy Spirit who are not settled into small groups [his, "classes of 12"], were "like sheep prepared for the slaughter."



The Last Word



Now is the time to **organize** and **launch** Home Bible Fellowships. Instead of waiting for our doors to close, we should **take charge** of the situation by **proactively** gathering people in our biblical homes, around Rabbi Jesus, to *worship* and *serve* him.

The Final Word

Home Bible Fellowships transform our homes into outposts for our **churches.** Not only will our churches enjoy the *immediate* benefits of Christ-*led* and - *centered* fellowships

But **each of us** will appreciate them even more in the *long run* when they enable our families to expand their influence to the community, prepare them for eternity, and *finish* the mission Christ has given to us.
